

TRANSFUSION

Contemporary art from
Georgia, Armenia and
Azerbaijan

The exhibition Transfusion is the result of a lasting collaboration between the Curators, Helen Hirsch (Switzerland) and Nino Tchogoshvili (Georgia). The first cooperation was a symposium, Grenzenlos erforschen (Research without boundaries), in the Tbilissi Goethe Institute in 2004. The desire for a joint, deep exploration of artistic strategies in the South Caucasus arose by the networking and collaboration with different representatives of the art scene in three countries – Armenia, Azerbaijan and Georgia.

Transfusion is the medical intervention in which vital components are taken from one body and transfused into an enfeebled body by intravenous transfer. The transfusion process can also be transferred onto a region like the Caucasus. On the one hand, the hope of a new market economy has been awakened by foreign investors, but on the other, the region is being deprived of important nutrients by this very intervention, for instance the BTC Track (Baku-Tbilisi-Ceyhan), a multinational pipeline project of BP. The gas pipeline begins at Baku, the capital of Azerbaijan, and stretches across Georgian territory up to Turkey's Mediterranean port of Ceyhan. The entailing ecological and economical damages are enormous.

The exhibition project at the Kunsthalle Palazzo in Liestal takes up artistic items from the three neighbouring countries of Georgia, Armenia and Azerbaijan. The starting position of the project is the comparison and analysis of strategies, which articulate subcutaneously the emotional and political instability of the respective countries and express them. The artists participating in the exhibition are from the middle and younger generations and are engaged in an international discourse with a strong local reference. In the categories of video, installation and photography, they conceive works with a documentary character for their first presentation in Switzerland.

The Armenian **Vahram Aghasyan's** works are devoted to the architectural legacy of the Soviet Union era. This architecture shapes the urban substance and has architectural scars, but also leaves behind utopian city suburbs. He puts one such suburb under the magnifying glass in Bangladesh. In an apparently spooky ghetto, people try to establish a human existence.

Sona Abgarian's photographic work, Caucasian, thematises the question of identity and belongingness of a Caucasian. The drawn figure seems to belong to a global and genderless world, and documents the schizophrenic Armenian situation, oscillating between the influence of Western pop culture and the post-Soviet past.

Irina Abjandadze, Georgia, presents photos of young people who died under mysterious circumstances during the changes in Georgia in the 1990s in the photo series Opfer (Victim). The silent interiors show private spaces of the dead and are a remembrance space for the relatives.

The video installation of **Iliko Zautashvili**, Georgia, Habits, Needs and..., picks up the mundane and everyday scenarios and searches for a universal language by scrutinising needs and habits with questions and answers.

The photo series Stecklinge (Saplings) of the Georgian, **Guram Tsibakhashvili**, portrays young people. They are, like young plants, connected with the earth and are characterised by typical physical features. Duplication of features in twins is representative for the expressive portraits.

The Azerbaijani artist **Chingiz Babayev** explores landscapes and the alterations in Baku generated by the presence of the multinational oil companies. His work, Dome, is a utopian architectural illustration with a claustrophobic aura.

Rashad Alekperov, Azerbaijan confronts the beholder in One point of view at two cities with a projected urban backdrop, which suggests the elements of Islamic culture and a Western city. The projected city arises by the shading of an accumulation of garbage and is the testimony of civilisation.

The group exhibition enables the visitor to create a kind of a cognitive map of this relatively unknown art region, which exemplifies a fascinating network of contemporary cultural identity questions and determinations of position. Thus emerge concrete and imaginary locations for experiences and discussions.

Helen Hirsch & Nino Tchogoshvili


